The Learning Outcomes for this unit are as follows:

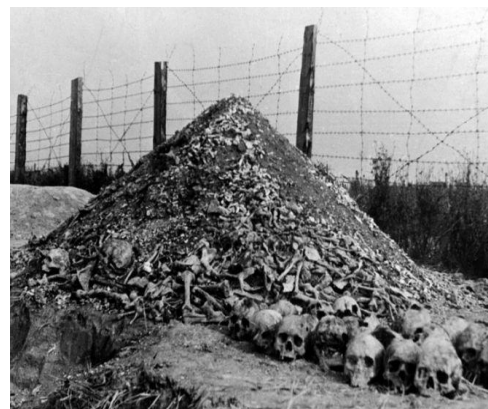
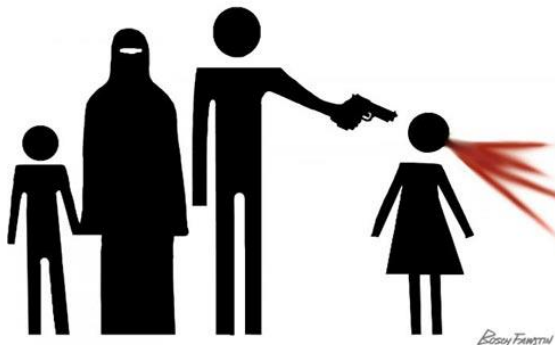
1. Understand how crime reporting affects the public perception of criminality
